Continuous Pentecost

s we continue in this Golden Jubilee of the Catholic Charismatic Renewal, I am reminded of the prophecy given in the Upper Room in Jerusalem during ICCRS' prophetic consultation in 2013:

"I will pour out my Spirit, I will pour out my Spirit, I will pour out my Spirit continually, generously, liberally and in abundance."

In learning more about Blessed Elena Guerra, her quote "Pentecost is... continually going on in every time and in every place..." made me reflect on that Upper Room prophecy. I've recently learned that the Holy Spirit Novena that has been a part of my life for the last 25 years was initiated by Pope Leo XIII in direct response to Blessed Elena Guerra's letters. I found out further that Pope Leo XIII desired that the Feast of Pentecost be a time of special prayer for UNITY. "... in Our Letter *Provida Matris*, We recommended to Catholics special prayers at the Feast of Pentecost, for the Re-union of Christendom..." (Divinum Illud Munus, May 1897).

As I believe the Charismatic Renewal is uniquely positioned to participate in the New Evangelization, I believe it is also uniquely positioned to participate in Pope Francis' call for unity. The Golden Jubilee celebration that will take place on the eve of Pentecost in Circus Maximus will be a display of that unity.

Acts 2:8–10: "And how is it that we hear, each of us in his own native language? Parthians and Medes and Elamites and residents of Mesopotamia, Judea and Cappadocia, Pontus and Asia, Phrygia and Pamphylia, Egypt and the parts of Libya belonging to Cyrene, and visitors from Rome, both Jews and proselytes, Cretans and Arabians, we hear them telling in our own tongues the mighty works of God."

May we this Pentecost, through the intercession of Blessed Elena Guerra and Pope Leo XIII, renew our commitment to living out our "Life in the Spirit" as a perennial Pentecost and our commitment to unity.

od has a plan for all of our lives and I believe that his plans for us are for our good (see Jer 29:11). I came into the Catholic Church and became a Christian when I was twenty-seven years old. I had never been baptized—I was unchurched. I remember clearly my baptismal day. I felt like I was caught up in something special; everything was new. Everything Catholic was wonderful.

I was going down to The Bayou Lafourche to be baptized and to receive my First Holy Communion. Lafourche is French for "fork." The ironic symbolism dramatically describes my lifechanging directional shift. This indeed was the fork in the road of my life.

I went down in the water with no fear. I was anticipating. I was overjoyed. I was filled up with God's love, his mercy, and his peace. I could not believe that I was being ushered into this great mystery of faith, of God, and of his people. My heart was spilling over with love. I could hardly believe that all the hate-filled thoughts that I had embraced in my past were now somehow separated from me.

All the indignity I had suffered as a young man disappeared as well. All the pain of seeing my family struggle for so many years and enduring the end of the Jim Crow Laws was gone. All of the humiliation in high school from a seemingly racist principal and teachers had vanished. My hatred of the people who threw the coke bottles, eggs, and garbage at me and my brothers while we waited for the bus after cutting their grass had been swept away. I came out of the baptismal waters and everyone there looked like they had the faces of angels.

After my baptism my life changed. I had forgiveness in my heart. I was able to hear people in a different way and accept their truth. I could offer forgive-

ness to those who asked and I could accept forgiveness where I asked it. God had changed my life by changing my heart and my mindset.

In this year of the Jubilee of the Catholic Charismatic Renewal, I am reminded in a special way of my baptismal experience. I am reminded that what God wants to do for his people is for all of his people. In the Year of Jubilee, God wants to restore his people! God wants to restore us all to fullness full health, healthy relationships, right seeing, and full knowledge that we are a beloved people and heirs to the Kingdom of God.

The Catholic Charismatic Renewal was started by a few people asking with a sincere and humble heart for more of God's Holy Spirit in their lives. Over the years, the Renewal has grown because people are still humbly asking the Lord to pour out his Spirit. This yearning for God is what keeps us a humble people—we search for God constantly because we know that our lives, our ministries, and all that we do would be nothing, would mean nothing, would accomplish nothing, without God.

Scripture teaches us that the blessing of the Jubilee Year is a three-fold blessing of rest, restoration, and return. In this Jubilee Year of the Catholic Charismatic Renewal, God desires to give his people rest, desires to restore what has been lost or taken, and desires to draw his people closer to himself.

While God offers us so much, we must

do our part to cooperate with his plan for us. We must seek to be humble and forgive those who have wronged us. We find true freedom when we follow the example of Jesus and forgive

those who trespass against us. The strongholds in our lives are broken through forgiveness and we are set free to be a new creation in Christ.

This Jubilee Year of the Catholic Charismatic Renewal is a time for rest and restoration and return. Let us praise God for all that he has done for us, is doing in us, and will do through us! •

Where is the Lord Leading Us?

An excerpt from a talk given to participants at the Gathering of the National Leadership Groups of the Catholic Charismatic Renewal in the U.S. plus international guests, in preparation for the 50th Anniversary Weekend, February 2017.

would like to suggest to us that this is a season for traveling light. The more traveling you do, you realize the fewer things you need with you on the journey. I see tourists at airports that only go on vacation once or twice a year and they have so many bags because they cannot imagine leaving home without two-thirds of their home with them. When you travel a lot you realize that you actually don't need so many things. The Lord wants us to travel light. Now what do I mean? I think, if we're honest, all of us are carrying an excess of "charismatic baggage." Now is the time to get away from that way of behaving and simply say, by the grace of God, in the power of the Holy Spirit I want to walk away from these things of the past that still hold me in captivity today. If there are things that hold you from your brothers and sisters because of things that happened five years ago, ten years ago, two years ago, etc. now is the time to develop a short memory and just to look toward the future and not hold on to and be held back by the things of the past.

Maybe our "charismatic baggage" tells us that some things are dangerous, we need to be careful. Of course, we need to make sure that we don't do stupid things. But sometimes we have said things were dangerous or we need to be careful because we were protecting ourselves. We don't want to be selfprotective. We don't need to be, be-

cause with the Holy Spirit, as a fire around us (Zec 2), we are completely protected in the Lord. It's not a season of narrow horizons, for self-protectionism. It's a season for doors to be opened, for horizons to be widened, for us to be more inclu-

sive than we have ever been before. So, if you have got excessive "charismatic baggage" it's time to say, I want to travel light.

I'm just going to, by the grace of God, pray for a breakthrough so that relationships that are not easy could come to a new place in the power of the Holy Spirit; **divisions** that really should not have happened can be simply repaired in the grace of the Holy Spirit, etc.

I think, now is a good opportunity (always it's a good opportunity), to repent. But particularly to repent of the things we have not seen. It's easy to repent of the mistakes we have made. But I believe that we didn't see some things happen because, in some ways we got in the way and we became a blockage to the Lord; we became a hindrance to the Holy Spirit. So, today might be a day that we repent of our disobedience, of our shortsightedness, of any ways in which we have stifled the Holy Spirit, times when maybe we allowed this current of grace to become diluted. In some parts of the world the Renewal is hardly charismatic because we did not want to offend anybody. I don't know who was offended but we said let's not move in any of the charisms, we might upset people. We ended up with a charismatic renewal that [just] sings songs to guitar music. Well, I'm sorry but that's not the Charismatic Renewal. So, for any ways we have diluted the grace of the Holy Spirit, let's be repentant today.

Any ways in which we have diverted our eyes from the things the Lord is doing, to the things that man is doing. How many times did we get into the habit of following the latest guru in the Renewal: Fr. So and So, Sr. So and So, Mr. Whoever, Mrs. Whoever has a great ministry in healing, deliverance, or whatever they're doing. We started to look to them rather than to look to the Lord and then our eyes went off onto human people rather than to the Spirit of God. We need to repent for the times when we allowed ourselves to get diverted and we need to say "Lord, bring us back to that source of living water."

Finally, any ways we got distracted. I believe we lost energy at different times in our history; we lost energy on stupid things. Every leader in this room can name many stupid things that took a lot of your time and your energy but really were not things of the Kingdom. Fr. Raniero Cantalamessa has a phrase that he uses: he says, "The work of the Lord would shine forth more brilliantly if only our pride was destroyed." Wow! I'm praying that prayer in my own way, you need to make your own prayers here, you need to write your own list. I'm just sharing my areas with you. I pray, "Lord, I don't want to be proud of heart; I don't want

to have eyes that are beyond me; I only want to be where you are and where your Spirit is. Draw us back, Lord. Draw us back to the heart, that place of intimacy, where our heart beats with your heart. Where you show us the vision that you have for us in our different realities in this season of the Holy Spirit."

Where are we going? Where is the Lord leading us?

I believe he's leading us in surprising ways. I believe he's saying to us, "Be ready," and I believe he's saying to us, "Be prepared." You need to make your own development of what this means to you. I believe the Lord is saying to us, "Think in bigger ways, ask my Spirit to expand your horizons." And I believe the Lord is saying, that the next few years are going to be years we could have never dreamed of. We don't have a road map, my friends, this is very exciting. [On the Duquesne Weekend when] the Holy Spirit came, the people received, and they didn't know what the next step was. We don't know what the next steps are for us but we do know that the Lord knows and we want to be in that place of faith where he leads us forward, in his ways, in his faith, and in his truth.

I go back to Joshua, to pick up a few threads: he came into a new season, Moses was dead, a new time was coming. We are in the crossover time between one season of the Spirit and the unfolding of the next season. And what did the Lord say to Joshua? First of all, he said: Get ready. Get provisions ready. Get things in place. Prepare your people, says the Lord. Prepare your people for a mighty breakthrough in the Holy Spirit so that when I come with a new visitation

people will be ready. Because it's easy to miss, even a visitation from the Lord, because you're distracted or diverted. So get provisions ready, for yourself and for your people. And then, the Lord said to Joshua, you have to leave the place where you are. Are you prepared to leave where the Lord has brought you to right now? See, we're all in that place where we think, "Whoa, this is wonderful." The Lord says no, you're a people of God and a people of God are a people on the move. So we need to be ready to move wherever the Lord asks us and to believe that he is with us. This is a time to be a pilgrim people in a way that maybe we've never done that before. The first 50 years were about establishing some things. I believe this next season will be much more about moving in the ways of the Spirit. And for that, as I said, we need to travel lightly. We are going to go to places, (that is what God said to Joshua) that we have never been before. Are you prepared for the Lord to take you to places you've never been before? Don't say you're too old, don't say you're too young, don't say any excuses, just say: "Lord, I'm ready. I'm ready for wherever you're leading me." And then, the word that the Lord gave Joshua was, "Sanctify yourself." The Lord, of course, sanctifies us but we need to be in that place where sanctification can take place. This is the place, this is the time, let's allow the Lord to do it among us and through us for his glory. Amen!

First, let's speak about the Gathering of National Leadership Groups.

In our 50-year experience of Charismatic Renewal, the Lord has poured out his Spirit in multiple ways. In the United States, this outpouring has led to various streams and expressions of renewal—Diocesan Renewal, various language and ethnic groups, communities, charismatic ministries, youth outreaches, and other charismatic expressions.

In 1995, leaders in the Charismatic Renewal felt led to gather proponents of all these expressions. And so began the *Gathering of National Leadership Groups*, a once-a-year meeting of leadership with three goals:

- That Renewal Leaders in the U.S. may know each other and share what the Lord is doing;
- That together we may listen to the Lord;
- ✤ That we may take any united action he directs us to.

Over the last 22 years, this Gathering has agreed to various statements: The Unity Statement, the Vision Statement, and the Covenant of Understanding are the most notable. The Gathering has undertaken many actions: the promoting of the Life in the Spirit Seminars every Easter Time; the establishment of a Charismatic National Day of Prayer on the Friday before Lent; the sponsoring of the 2007, 2012 and 2017 National Conferences to celebrate 40-, 45- and 50years of Renewal; and the establishment of a 5-Year Committee to outline how to celebrate this Jubilee.

Every year, in a three-day encounter, about 60 leaders gather—from the National Service Committee, the Haitian National Council, the Hispanic National Service Committee, the Filipino Alliance, the Association of Diocesan Liaisons, the Catholic Fraternity, and from other national groups.

The Year 2017 offered the *Gathering* a triple opportunity: the 50th Anniversary, the celebration of the *Duquesne Weekend* on February 17-19, and the acquisition by the Charismatic Renewal of *The Ark and The Dove Retreat House*, north of Pittsburgh. Being led to move the Gathering from January to this weekend, and led to go to The Ark and The Dove to be at the birthplace of the Renewal, the committee planned to meet where Jesus began this out-


pouring in the Catholic Church. And since many international leaders were interested in coming to the Pittsburgh area for this anniversary, the Committee decided to invite ICCRS, the Catholic Fraternity, and other international leaders—a *Gathering Plus*!

So, from February 15 to 17, about 90 leaders gathered at the Embassy Suites near the Pittsburgh Airport. The Gathering had several elements. There were two teachings, one by Walter Matthews on "*The Fruits of the Renewal*" and one by Michelle Moran on "*Where is the Lord leading us?*" There was a lot of prayer and listening together. And there was a visit to The Ark and The Dove, where the Gathering members broke up into three groups, each of which spent almost an hour in the chapel of The Ark and The Dove.

During these three days Jesus spoke a very clear word: he told the leaders of Charismatic Renewal that their vision was much smaller than his. He has intentions of renewing his entire Church and evangelizing many people, and he expects us to cooperate with his plan!

The Gathering Plus proper ended on the morning of Friday, February 17. On Friday evening and continuing to Saturday, thirty more people joined us for the 50th Anniversary. As we gathered at The Ark and The Dove on Saturday morning around the **Cross of the Renewal**, the entire group came to Jesus.

We were inspired by Patti Mansfield's retelling of the story of what happened at the *Dusquesne Weekend* retreat. We all gave ourselves to Jesus again. May he pour out his Spirit anew!

n the 50th Anniversary of the event known around the world as the *Duquesne Weekend*, charismatics from six continents, from 17 countries, speaking 13 languages, gathered at The Ark and The Dove Retreat house outside Pittsburgh for a Jubilee Celebration.

The celebration began on Friday evening, February 17, with a keynote from Michelle Moran, the President of ICCRS. She shared how the *Duquesne Weekend* nearly did not happen because of a plumbing problem. But what began as a water problem has resulted in a river of life, a current of grace, flowing through our church for the last 50 years.

ICCRS commissioned a 9 foot tall "Cross of the Renewal" to be installed at The Ark and The Dove. On Saturday morning of our celebration, with singing and prayer by representatives from around the world, we dedicated this Cross of the Renewal as a sign of reclaiming this site as the home of baptism in the Holy Spirit. The placement of the cross is such that when anyone turns into the driveway of The Ark and The Dove, the first thing they will see is this wonderful sign of the Renewal, the crucifix with the banner *Veni Creator Spiritus*, and at the end of the banner, a dove.

The Ark and The Dove Jubilee Celebration

Saturday afternoon, after a time of praise and worship and listening to the Lord, Bishop David Zubik of Pittsburgh celebrated a special Jubilee Mass of the Holy Spirit.

And on Saturday evening, February 18, 2017, exactly 50 years to the day when the Holy Spirit fell in power on a small group of college students, one of those students, a coed named Patti Gallagher (now) Mansfield, retold the story from that upper room chapel. With people spread throughout the building participating through video streaming to each room, we began by singing the Latin hymn, Veni Creator Spiritus. We continued to praise and worship, and as we again heard the story of the historic Duquesne Weekend, we re-dedicated ourselves to repentance, humility and openness to an encounter with the Holy Spirit.

Two prophetic words resonated during the weekend. The first prophetic word was a reading from Genesis 7:11-12. "In the six hundredth year of Noah's life, in the second month, on the seventeenth day of the month, on that day all the springs of the great deep burst forth, and the floodgates of the heavens were opened. The rain fell on the earth forty days and forty nights." In the second month, on the seventeenth day of the month, that is to say, on February 17! Fifty years ago, on the

At one point during the weekend, we locked arms as a sign of our unity, representing various streams of the Renewal, different ethnicities, demonstrating our love for each other as we proclaim to the world



Today reconciliation between Christians and spiritual ecumenism is my primary mission working in response to the desire and prayer of Jesus (Jn 17:21-22).

It is Christ who brings life-giving waters as was promised by the prophets. It is in his own baptism in the Jordan River that he lowered himself into the waters of repentance for sin, our sin. Through this he brings about, in his ascent out of the waters, an encounter as the Spirit descends as a Dove of Peace. This time the Dove is no longer a symbol of reconciliation as in the days of Noah, but rather a visible presence of the divine life that flows down upon man. This gift of true encounter with the Father, Son and Holy Spirit, as heaven meets earth, gives way to our divine life in the Trinity. When we dwell in the heart of the Trinity, it is our heart that changes. The living waters flow out from the Living God. He possesses the running river of his lifegiving Spirit. We are not just speaking of one river, but rivers. A river by nature has excess. It is flowing. There is no situation where God's goodness cannot provide sufficient grace.

The water is living. It is vivacious. It is life-giving and changing. By its very nature it brings hope, life and joy to our lives. We are called to be fruitful. One of the intentional ways of being fruitful is to live the fruits of the Holy Spirit. "But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, self-control; against such things there is no law" (Gal 5:22-23).

We should remember that the reason for the image of the river is that it reaches beyond our own lives. Just as God is love, his goodness overflows from his throne down to the shores of earth. God's love is spilling over into the lives of others. He is like a river current which is compelled with looking to where it can flow. We might want to hold on to what God has given us. Don't. The best thing is to acknowledge it, find a scripture that accompanies it, thank God for it and in your abundance share God's glory with others. The moment we try to capture and hold on to that blessing, like water in our hands it flows out and cannot be held. We must live our lives in the present.

Now on the last day, the great day of the feast, Jesus stood and cried out saying, "If any man is thirsty, let him come to me and drink. He who believes in me, as the Scripture said, 'From his innermost being shall flow rivers of living water'" (Jn 7:37-38). Whether gathered together at this Jubilee celebration or in your own community, let us seek to see the abundance of this living water flowing amongst God's people so that his Spirit can renew the face of the earth. s the planning committee for the Jubilee Conference gathered and we were discerning Pope Francis' words to the Renewal and the upcoming 50th Anniversary of the Catholic Charismatic Renewal, it seemed that in order to properly depict the grace of baptism in the Holy Spirit, we needed to be entering the "rivers of living water" (Jn 7:38).

Immersion in the living water provides cleansing and nourishment. Historically, we see that the Jewish ritual provided for numerous purifications by water. The high priest was to bathe to be prepared especially for the great Day of Atonement. We experienced this in the Jubilee Year of Mercy that occurred last year, an invitation to enter into the cleansing water. It is understood that Christ instituted a new mode of purification at the wedding at Cana. He foretold it in symbolic manner when he changed water destined for ritual cleansings (Jn 2:6) into wine, which symbolizes both Spirit and the purifying Word (Jn 15:3). In the Dictionary of Biblical Theology, it goes on to state that the eschatological waters hold an important place in the perspective of restoration of the people of God. It says that God will distribute in abundance the purifying waters which will cleanse the heart of man and thus enable him

Glory Days?

by Fr. Rory T. Conley n that Thursday evening in March more than 150 people gathered in the parish hall for the first session of the Life in the Spirit seminar.

Four days later, on Sunday morning, another 50 people gathered in the same hall for *their* first session of the seminar. Glory days from the past history of the Catholic Charismatic Renewal? No. These events occurred in March of 2017 in this Golden Jubilee Year of the Renewal.

The organizers of the seminar—the pastor of the parish, the deacon and the fifteen members of the evangelization committee—were overwhelmed by the response. For a few years they had been working together to bring to the parish the principles of discipleship through homilies, faith formation activities and occasional post-Communion witness talks.

Although the pastor had come of age when the CCR was at its previous height, he had little real awareness of it. As for the rest of the committee, while some had heard the term "Charismatic Renewal" they didn't know what it was and none of them had heard of the Life in the Spirit seminar.

As the committee members gathered regularly for prayer and discussion about promoting discipleship in the parish, they found themselves on a journey which led them to embrace the spirituality of the Renewal. This prompted them to offer prayer services for healing in the parish for the first time. Along the way men's and women's prayer groups were formed by members of the committee as well as new ministries for the divorced and for middle school youth. Bible studies, the ChristLife series and presentations on *Unbound* deliverance ministry followed. Praise and worship music was also introduced at a Sunday Mass twice a month.

While the response to these efforts was good for a parish of 800 families, only a portion of the parishioners were participating in these activities. Their most recent effort, bi-monthly presentations of Fr. Dave Pivonka's DVD series on the Holy Spirit, *The Wild Goose*, had eighty participants at the start. During the course of this series the committee members pledged to fast on Fridays in hopes that their physical hunger would bless the parish with a hunger for the Spirit.

In the fall of 2016 the committee decided to offer *The Gift-Life in the Spirit Series* produced in 2015 by the Renewal in the U.K. as a Lenten exercise for the parish. Wrong liturgical season of course, but a time when Catholics are willing to do something more for their spiritual growth. Two Sundays before the *Gift* series was to begin the pastor gave a witness talk on his own experience of baptism in the Spirit at all four weekend Masses. Among other things he told the parishioners that it lead him to a deeper experience of the love of Jesus. He also told them it was the most important event in his life since the day of his ordination twenty-seven years before. The next Sunday the deacon of the parish, an army veteran of many recent conflicts, shared how baptism in the Spirit had brought him healing and unspeakable joy.

But still, after all the seed planting and blessings received, no one on the committee expected the response of the parishioners. The sign-ups for the series were brisk to start with and then they just kept coming. On the last few days before the first session the numbers doubled to over two hundred. Parishioners who had never come to anything before were signing up and people from other parishes as well. Even a few former Catholics who now worshiped as Pentecostals wanted to come. The numbers for Thursday night far exceeded what the committee was prepared for but everyone who called or emailed was welcomed to join. The committee members reasoned, "If the Spirit is sending these people, who are we to say 'no?'"

When all the people who had signed up converged on the hall, it was a logistical challenge for the committee to find places for them all and facilitators to guide each small group. In spite of the confusion, the committee members were giddy in the excitement of seeing what the Lord was doing. Clearly the Holy Spirit was moving in the hearts of his people *who only needed to be encouraged to invite him in.*

Five weeks later 204 people received prayer for baptism in the Holy Spirit. One participant wrote of the experi-

ence: "I have not spoken in tongues, but I have spoken with love to my family and friends. Three days later and I am still at peace and full of happiness and thankfulness." Another said: "It was truly a beautiful evening to witness the love, joy and peace throughout the room. These feelings carried over to my ride home. I started praising God for a wonderful night. I continued to praise and ask the Holy Spirit for his gifts. After saying "Come Holy Spirit" several times I started to sing "Come Holy Spirit." Next thing I knew I was singing in tongues! It was truly amazing.... a beautiful melody that only he could interpret from my heart!"

The first praise hymn sung during the series was Jim Cowan's "Come Into My Heart" and the last was Matt Maher's "Your



Grace Is Enough." Glory days indeed!

A Jubilee and a Journey

y last column, entitled "I Have a Dream," was written six months ago on September 30. On October 15, my wife Claire was involved in a major automobile accident in which she suffered a smashed left hip socket, broken bones and a smashed ankle in her right leg, and ten "broken, cracked, bruised" ribs. She survived, as did the motorcyclist who had strayed across the county road not far from our parish church into the dead center of the front of our car.

We are very grateful Claire survived. She has had four surgeries, spent four and a half months in a skilled nursing and rehab center and nine days in a rehabilitation hospital. She was discharged to home health care a month ago. After three weeks, she begins outpatient physical therapy tomorrow. She still has a long way to go. The surgeons have indicated a timeframe of her not being able to walk independently for a year after the accident. It has changed our lives.

Yet it is our, the Renewal's, Jubilee and a time, I wrote in the "Special Golden Jubilee Issue" "for giving thanks for what the Lord has done in our lives, in my life!, and acknowledging that it is not something we have earned or merited but rather it is the reception of a great grace." There I was talking about baptism in the Holy Spirit, but I could have been talking about the salvation won for us on the cross—as well as grace amidst the challenges of this personal journey.

Thanks to our young adult children I was able to speak at the Diocese of Wilmington, Delaware's Conference the Saturday after the accident, attend and serve as Chairman at the National Leaders' and Ministries' Conference in Atlanta in early November, and, more recently, attend the Gathering of National Leadership Groups and the Jubilee Celebration held at The Ark and The Dove in mid-February. I know there was grace in all of these events!

Even more so there has been grace in these months, especially for Claire. She will tell you of the power of the Father's love reaching out to her in the millisecond between when she saw the motorcyclist come across the road toward her, and in the power of Jesus' name she began to say repeatedly. She knows that she would not be alive except for that love and power—and she knows that she would not be as far along in her healing and recovery without all the prayer (and fasting!) that has been done for her.

At the end of the "Special Golden Jubilee Issue" Mary Healy encouraged us to "celebrate the Jubilee as *rest...*as *release...*[and] as *return* by returning to our first love, the passion for Jesus that was kindled in us by the Holy Spirit, and to childlike trust in God and openness to his gifts." I pray you are doing so. This Jubilee *is* a wedding feast, let us rejoice.

In the words of Pope Francis, "In this Jubilee Year, let us allow God to surprise us. He never tires of throwing open the doors of his heart and repeats that he loves us and wants to share his love with us."
