Our Healing Commission

ust before ascending, Jesus gave his healing commission: "lay hands on the sick, and they will recover." The biblical tradition to lay hands was used to bless children, ordain for ministry, dedicate one to the Lord's service, and empower leadership succession. Jesus laid hands to heal the physically sick, deliver the demonically afflicted, and raise the dead. In Acts, the laying on of hands imparted the fullness of the Holy Spirit. Today the Renewal is recognized for continuing this ministry of laying on of hands for baptism in the Holy Spirit, divine empowerment, and healing.

How many times have we heard others express doubt that God can heal them of spiritual, emotional or physical sickness? Perhaps their skepticism stems from little or no faith, or the perception that God does not love them. Perhaps they are filled with unforgiveness or falsely believe their identity is in sickness. These are our mission territory.

We are called to be instruments of healing, so that the sick may know the love of God and have faith in the Lord's healing mercy to face their affliction. As we exercise charisms in the power of the Holy Spirit, the faith of those who are sick can be strengthened and with new courage they pick up their mats and walk. While they may not receive the physical healing they seek, our desire is for them to receive the greatest gift—the fullness of the Spirit that reconciles them to God and leads to eternal life.

The harvest is abundant. At a time when many are sick and have little faith, let's respond to our healing commission by laying hands so they might recover with the fullness of the Holy Spirit and an expectant faith to embrace divine mercy for the deepest healing God desires ... that of salvation.

orty-six years ago I met someone who changed my life. It was a "chance" meeting of a stranger on a sidewalk who, at the end of the conversation, asked me a question, "Do you know Jesus?"

That was a dark time for me. I balked at the remark but it struck a chord. I noted her address. A few weeks later I joined her at my first prayer meeting. I have been on fire and in love with Jesus ever since. When I moved to Florida, after retiring from teaching, I came to a vibrant parish and have been very active in various ministries. There was just one thing missing. For nine years of retirement I had no prayer community.

I felt a hunger in me to pray in the Spirit with others who share a love for Jesus and the Holy Spirit. After giving my witness at a parish mission right before the Pandemic, some people asked if I would start a prayer group. Two years later that still haunted me. This year I hosted a Parish Synod Listening Session in February. The desire for a prayer group was presented. The Lord was asking a second time to respond to the hunger. Having been in leadership for years, I was well aware of the responsibility of taking this on. In prayer and adoration I sought direction. As I re-read my prayer journal now, I see how carefully Jesus led me and continued to validate the mission.

By the end of May we had a small Core Team who met weekly to pray. Jesus told me he was orchestrating everything. I see how pieces of his plan came together. A new deacon arrived in March; he had been through Life in the Spirit and attended a charismatic prayer



meeting for a while. He is on the core team. The others, a Faith Formation Lead teacher, and our Parish Music Minister, had experiences in discipleship, but were unfamiliar with the Renewal. We are blessed to have a Baptist minister join us periodically. We shared a craving that only coming together and building a culture of unity in prayer could satisfy. Through openness and mutual trust we became bonded with Jesus and each other.

Just as this process was beginning I stumbled upon the CHARIS website. The Spirit seemed to keep calling me back to the Integral Formation Program. I could not get it out of my head. On my third visit to the website, I enrolled. Little did I know then how significantly it would impact the formation of our core team!

After four months of praying, preparing, and learning together, *Spirit And Grace Prayer Group* was ready to open on the eve of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross. There were eleven of us on the first night and six new people came the next week. Hurricane Ian interrupted us but this week we were back singing and praising!

There is a deep hunger out there. I think after the disruption of Covid people are searching. Every week I get another call in response to the ad in

the bulletin. Newcomers to the parish have sought it out. Some people have never experienced praying aloud in a group. We carefully and considerately bring them along, encouraging them to relax and enjoy the experience with no pressure. Today after Mass a member stopped me to say how vital it is for her to come to the meeting and be fed.

A core member recently shared, I have been involved in other types of worship and fellowship. The one thing that has made all the difference with the Prayer Group is that I have begun to connect with the gift of praying in the Spirit. This has led me to approach situations with less anxiety and has elevated my prayer life beyond all expectations.

This is the Shepherd's plan. People are searching; they want something new. They may not know what it is that will satisfy their yearning. When they taste the love that Jesus pours out, and discover a relationship, they are hooked! I know. I have been hooked for 46 years!

Charismatic Renewal in the Twentieth Century and Beyond

s God alive and active today? Are the Charismatic gifts real? Does God really want to give *me* these gifts?

As a young adult, I questioned my faith and the bible. I grew up in the Christian Community of God's Delight (CCGD), a Catholic Charismatic Covenant Community in Dallas where everyone around me was visibly living their faith. It was one thing to see faith lived out, but I had to decide for myself.

One day I read an interesting verse in Paul's letter to the Romans (8:28): "We know that all things work for good for those who love God, who are called according to his purpose." I was trying to love God, felt called, was attending Community events, and praying...so I decided to put God to the test. If Paul's words were true, then presumably even bad events in my life would work for good. I thought of the worst thing that had ever happened to me, and this event was a great test since I concluded that nothing good had, nor possibly could, come from it.

Soon afterwards, in a conversation with my mother, I asked her how our family got our start with Community. As if the Lord was smiling on me, she explained the exact event that I had thought of and explained how it had led her and my dad to start attending prayer meetings and eventually to our family joining Community. I was shocked. See, my entire family was deeply involved in the Community, and it was life-changing for all of us.

What God showed me that day was that he could take what I characterized as the worst thing in my life and turn it into the best thing, not only for me, but also for my entire family. Not only did I conclude that Paul was correct, but on that day, I was further convinced that God was alive, intervening in my life, and investing in a relationship of love. So it is with every single one of us, his children!

In the same way that I questioned my family's encounter with the Charismatic Renewal, I asked the broader question "Why now?" Why had God decided to pour forth his Holy Spirit, as in a second Pentecost, in my lifetime? Why not 200 years ago...or 200 years from now?

That led me to the stories of Blessed Elena Guerra, Pope Leo XIII, Topeka Kansas, Bethel Bible College, Charles Fox Parham, Stone's Folly, Azusa Street Revival, and the Duquesne weekend. This short article cannot do justice to those stories, but the more I read, the more it sounded like my own story. God wanted his people to know that he IS ALIVE, that he is very active today, and that he very much

wants to impart his charismatic gifts to every one of us. His eternal hope is that we turn to him, surrender to him, and ask for the extraordinary charisms (1 Cor 12) with which he wants to empower us!

Proof is found in looking into the story of the emergence of the Charismatic Renewal in the twentieth century. It started with Blessed Elena Guerra writing letters to Pope Leo XIII, pleading for him to pray for a new Pentecost. Pope Leo did so on January 1, 1901, calling the whole Church to join him in praying for an outpouring of the Holy Spirit using the words of: Veni Creator Spiritus: Come Creator Spirit. God responded almost immediately by sending his Holy Spirit upon students at Bethel Bible College in Topeka, Kansas at a place known as Stone's Folly. This outbreak of spiritual gifts spread and grew at the Azusa Street Mission in Los Angeles, recognized as the start of the Pentecostal movement. Later, in a well-chronicled event, the Holy Spirit was poured out upon college students and professors at a retreat in Duquesne at the Ark and the Dove retreat center (now home of Pentecost Today USA) who were attending a retreat there in 1967. This event sparked the spread of the Charismatic Renewal to the Catholic Church, where it is now estimated that over 100 million people have been baptized in the Spirit and are living transformed lives.

If we read the details about the people in this story (one source is Lee Defendorf's *It's All in God's Plan*) we learn that Blessed Elena Guerra and all the others were normal people like you and me living out their faith. It was God, who is so in love with his children, who is intervening, answering prayers, pouring out his Holy Spirit and investing in relationships of love with everyone who will engage him.

What is our response to this proof that God is alive and active today, pouring out his charismatic gifts on everyone? Our Holy Father Pope Francis provides the answer. His top priority for the Renewal is that we share baptism in the Holy Spirit with the entire Church (6/8/2019). He was quoted in a morning meditation (5/9/16) as saying, "To many unaware Christians, the Holy Spirit is a perfect stranger." Our Holy Father is asking us to be active in introducing the Holy Spirit and his powerful spiritual gifts to our family and neighbors. To specifically bring our friends and loved ones with us to Mass, prayer meetings, bible studies, healing services... give them our personal testimony and demonstrate the charismatic gifts. This is our personal charge...to demonstrate that God

is alive and active today and empowering us with his charismatic gifts! ◆

Jesus Baptizes with the Holy Spirit

Il four gospels recount the words of John the Baptist about the coming Messiah who will "baptize with the Holy Spirit." In Acts, this promise is repeated by Jesus himself. The Greek preposition used in these passages can be translated as "in" or "with." Thus, we can refer to the baptism "in" or "with" the Spirit. What then does "baptize" mean? Based on the meanings of the Greek word "baptizo," we can say that Jesus comes to dip, immerse, plunge, drench and overwhelm us with the Holy Spirit!

The Sacramental View

The sacrament of Baptism is sometimes described as baptism in the Spirit. In contrast to John's baptism in water as a sign of repentance, Christian baptism is a baptism in water and Spirit. The Sacrament of Baptism makes us temples of the Holy Spirit. Baptism is completed by Confirmation which the Catechism describes as an outpouring of the Spirit to perpetuate the grace of Pentecost in the Church. However, it is one thing to be "given" the gift of the Spirit in the sacraments, it is another thing to existentially "receive" that gift in personal experience. When the disciples were baptized in the Spirit on the day of Pentecost, they experienced a life-transforming immersion in the Spirit. They were anointed with power from on high, interiorly filled by the Spirit within, broke out in praise, spoke in tongues, and began to proclaim the gospel with boldness. For them, baptism in the Spirit was something experienced.

The Experiential View

Just as the disciples received an experience of the Spirit on Pentecost, we too can experience the Spirit in our own personal Pentecost. In this view, baptism in the Spirit is an experience of

being immersed and filled with the Holy Spirit, characterized by surrender to the Lord Jesus, awareness of the Father's love, and overflow of the Spirit's power often manifested by tongues and other charismatic manifestations.

There is debate in the Catholic Charismatic Renewal as how best to understand this experience in relation to the sacraments. Some emphasize the connection to the sacraments, describing baptism in the Spirit as a release or actualization of the graces of Baptism and Confirmation. Others distinguish between the sacramental graces of initiation and later free charismatic graces that St. Thomas described as new sendings of the Spirit. They describe baptism in the Spirit as a fresh outpouring of the Spirit bringing new graces of renewal and empowering.

These two perspectives are not mutually exclusive if we understand the sacrament of Baptism as the doorway into a life of ongoing prayer for ever new outpourings of the Spirit. Baptism in the Spirit is a new outpouring but one rooted in our adoption as children of God received in the sacrament of Baptism. As beloved children of God, we cry out with confidence, again and again, "Come Holy Spirit!"


The Holistic View

There is another way to understand John's proclamation that is broader and includes both the sacramental and experiential views. When John said the one coming will baptize in the Spirit, he was giving a summary statement of the overall meaning and purpose of the Messiah's mission. Jesus' mission is not finished at the cross, nor the resurrection nor even in his ascension. The goal of Jesus' coming is Pentecost. Jesus longed to cast fire on the earth, the fire

of the Holy Spirit which renews all it touches (Luke 12:49). He told his disciples that if he went away something better would come (John 16:7). Christ ascends in order to continually pour out the Spirit upon his people (Acts 2:33; 1 Cor. 15:45). From this perspective, baptism in the Holy Spirit describes the goal and fruit of Jesus' mission as forming a people filled with the Spirit and anointed with power to be agents of proclamation, healing, and renewal until Christ comes again.

Gifted to Make a Difference

n the day of Pentecost St. Peter made a prophetic statement. After his anointed homily, the listening crowds asked what should they do to respond to God's message of salvation. He said: "Repent and be baptized, every one of you, in the name of Jesus Christ for the forgiveness of your sins; and you will receive the gift of the holy Spirit. For the promise is made to you and to your children and to all those far off, whomever the Lord our God will call" (Acts 2:38-39). Praise God! This gift of the Spirit is meant for every generation.

Those of you who are reading this article have already been baptized in the Holy Spirit. This prophetic promise has been fulfilled in your life. In the understanding of the scriptures the

gift you have received is to be given. God didn't pour out his Spirit upon us just to sanctify us. He anointed and empowered us with his gifts to bring others into the awareness of God's promise of the Spirit to them.

Jesus didn't disciple the twelve and the seventy-two just for their sake. He formed them and sent them ahead of him to announce the Good News of God's love. They were to prepare the way for the fuller message of Jesus, which would transform the hearts of the hearers. Jesus has done the same to us for the same purpose.

I remember a prophetic word God gave me at a National Conference of the Charismatic Renewal. At first, I hesitated to give it, because it was so strong of a word. But through the encouragement of another spirit-filled person I spoke this word. "My people, I have blessed you with the outpouring of my Holy Spirit. I have gifted and empowered you. I didn't give you my gifts just to make you feel good. I gave them to you to make a difference in the lives of others. If you do not use my gifts, I will give them to others who will."

What good are the gifts of the Holy Spirit if, after they have been received, they become dormant within us? Could the words of Jesus about salt be applicable here? "You are the salt of the earth. But if salt loses its taste, with what can it be seasoned? It is no longer good for anything but to be thrown out and trampled underfoot" (Mt 5:13).

It is God's plan for everyone to be filled with his Holy Spirit. But as is evidenced in the scriptures his plan is accomplished through others to reach those yet to be baptized in the Spirit. We know the effects of baptism in the Spirit in our own lives. We know how we became more "alive" as we yielded ourselves to the Lordship of Jesus and the power of his Spirit. As someone witnessed and evangelized us, so now it is our continual privilege to do the same for the people God puts in our path. It is our turn to be the light of the world. "Your light must shine before others, that they may see your good deeds and glorify your heavenly Father" (Mt 5:16).

As someone has said: If not you, who? If not now, when? If not the promise of the Holy Spirit, what? The vision of God given to the Church on the Day of Pentecost, proclaimed by Peter, is in our hands to continue to be spread to this generation. We have been called, chosen and gifted. In the words of St. Peter: "Always be ready to give an explanation to anyone who asks you for a reason for your hope, but do it with gentleness and reverence, keeping your conscience clear" (1 Pet 3:15-16). We are the now generation. With God's grace we can do it. •



A Fruit of the Catholic Charismatic Renewal

hen God poured out his Holy Spirit afresh on a group of university students gathered in the little upper room chapel at the retreat center in Gibsonia, Pennsylvania in 1967, little could we have imagined the fruit that this grace would bring to the Church.

A New Religious Community

After almost 20 years of following the lead of the Holy Spirit and living the religious life, the Disciples of the Lord Jesus Christ received word from Rome that the Church had approved our constitutions.

This is an excerpt from Mother John Marie's book, Laying the Foundation: "In his homily, Bishop Matthiesen spoke of our making history as the first explicitly charismatic religious community to be accepted by the Church. "... this day, Sunday, April 7, 1991, this glorious day, this historic day, on which in a few minutes, we will witness the formal erection of the Disciples of the Lord Jesus Christ as a Religious Institute of Diocesan Right." He concluded his homily by saying, "Today we are witnesses to an important ecclesial event in the life of the Diocese of Amarillo as well as in that of the universal Church."

Shortly after this event, the then Apostolic Pro-Nuncio, Archbishop Agostino Cacciavillan came to the diocese of Amarillo and he wanted to meet us. I so clearly remember the day when he walked into our chapel at Prayer Town. What excitement filled our hearts! These words from a humble and great shepherd of the Church stayed with me: "You should be faithful to your identity, to your charism as a Community...."

That identity and charism is the fruit of the "current of grace" that was poured out upon the whole Church. Our identity is 100% Catholic, 100% Charismatic, 100% Franciscan, 100% Eucharistic and 100% Marian. We embrace and live it all! The charism given to us is prayer, praise and evangelization. We are contemplative by nature with evangelistic apostolates that flow from a life of deep prayer.

As our life revolves around liturgical, communal and personal prayer, for us evangelization then becomes a way of life. We long for people to come to know God who loves them so dearly. Whether on mission or at home, we try to live every moment in silent communion with God and offer every

prayer, sacrifice, and even mundane tasks for the salvation of souls.

In 2004, we were returning from a School of Evangelization with Renewal Ministries in Michigan. On the way, we prayed with the intention of knowing what God was asking of us. Among other things, he wanted us to renew our missionary journeys to foreign countries. So it was decided that if God really wants this he would give us a sign and confirm it through an invitation to go on a foreign mission.

Hardly a week passed before we received two phone calls. First, Tom Edwards, a country coordinator for Renewal Ministries, called to ask if we could send Sisters to join his team on an evangelistic outreach to the Czech Republic and Slovakia. Then he called again and asked for a Sister to join the team for a mission to Tanzania. That year I went to Tanzania, East Africa; Sister Therese and Sister Joan went to the Czech Republic and Slovakia; and Sister Bernadette to Uganda.

Since then, I went to Tanzania and Kenya every year for the six years that followed with different Sisters accompanying me and then other

Sisters continuing to go every year. Among the many blessings of this mission, God sent us Sister Mary Justin, a vocation from Tanzania, who is now a final professed Sister. Our missions continued to Brazil, El Salvador, Trinidad and to the underground church in a country I cannot name.

Foreign missions were part of our beginnings. Mother John Marie went to Japan, Russia, Poland, India, Mexico and other countries when it was not easy to take the Gospel there. She relied on the Holy Spirit to lead her and guide her as she sowed the seeds of faith generously in many different settings.

Our religious community is one fruit of the Charismatic Renewal that has in turn borne and continues to bear abundant

fruit in the Church and in the world. •






Each tool, resource, and pilot of THE JOSHUA PROJECT is being discerned and developed in light of the vision, wisdom, prayer, and ideas shared via:

- 1) Overall survey results
- 2) Individual survey responses
- 3) Discussion forums

All 777 Renewal Leaders who registered for the 2021 National Leaders Meeting were invited to complete a survey in preparation for THE JOSHUA PROJECT Discussion Forums.

Exactly 695 Renewal Leaders responded, and here are highlights of their Renewal involvement and survey responses.





NATIONAL DISCUSSION FORUMS

Over 150 Renewal Leaders from across the nation participated in online discussion forums led by Board and Council Members of Pentecost Today USA at the first National Discussion Forums of THE JOSHUA PROJECT in December of 2021.

Each discussion forum focused on needs and opportunities to BRING. BUILD. SERVE. together and to reach and raise up younger generations in 1) different realities of the Renewal and 2) different parts of the Church.



NATIONAL LEADERS SURVEY RESPONSE

After THE JOSHUA PROJECT launched with an army of FIRE STARTERS' sacrificial support and prayer, the Lord opened doors for us to initially respond to the 2021 National Leaders Survey with 1) adding charismatic gift teaching, witness, and saint feature pages to the upcoming issues of our magazine, 2) launching weekly quotes from the ICCRS/CHARIS Doctrinal Commission on Baptism in the Holy Spirit to our social media posts (#TheologyThursday) 3) launching a test phase of a Phone App that will feature tools and resources to start and sustain a Prayer Group and connect with local Prayer Groups, Renewal Centers, Ministries, and Covenant Communities.

NATIONAL DISCUSSION FORUM RESPONSE

Soon after the December 2021 Discussion Forums, many participants shared a desire for further discussion, prayer, and collaboration – some with great needs for help and others with a deep desire to share ideas and tools. This led to the launch of Ongoing Regional Discussion Forums in 2022 and Collaboratives in 2023.

- 2) Ongoing Regional Discussion Forums [BUILD]
- 3) Collaboratives Serving Specific Needs [SERVE]


ONGOING REGIONAL DISCUSSION FORUMS

In 2022, the Regional Discussion Forums of THE JOSHUA PROJECT launched in partnership with Renewal Centers hosting small, informal prayer-filled gatherings.

Renewal Leaders and Church Leaders including clergy, religious, seminarians, and lay persons met, shared, and prayed together in an extraordinary prophetic act of unity - some meeting for the first time ever and some coming together for the first time in decades.

Renewal Leads to Freedom: The Story of Unbound Ministry

od has plans for each of us that are bigger than we can imagine. In January of 1970 I was baptized in the Spirit and my life changed. I experienced the love of God rushing into my heart and the emptiness and purposelessness leaving. I led a prayer group, then a small community, and an outreach to college students. Later, I worked for a city wide renewal movement. I was never on the conference circuit as a speaker and most national leaders did not know my name. I was not looking for a spotlight, I just wanted to do the next thing that the Lord had for me. Mostly that meant trying to help the people he brought into my life.

As I sought to grow in my own personal freedom and to help others be set free, the Lord prompted me to write a book— Unbound: A Practical Guide to Deliverance. This changed the direction of my life. Now I lead Heart of the Father Ministries, which brings the message of the Five Keys of Unbound ministry around the world. There are Unbound ministry teams in over 30 nations. Unbound has been translated into 20 languages. God is full of surprises! I have learned that his plans and his timing are always the best.

I would like to share with you a brief introduction to Unbound ministry. Many of you have heard about Unbound and might be wondering what is unique about this approach to healing and deliverance. Unbound offers a fresh perspective on many of the principles of ministry that I learned in the Renewal over many years.

Unbound is a ministry of healing and freedom that helps people to break free from their spiritual bondage. Unbound gives people the opportunity to tell their story in a safe and loving environment, surrender to God's power, offer forgiveness to others, and to experience God's tender love.

In an Unbound ministry session, participants meet with a team that is taught to listen to their story with compassion and love and to recognize the chains that hold them back. The team leads those who seek freedom through the Five Keys, which are five responses that invite the power of Jesus to set hearts free.

Recently I had only ten minutes during a break to pray with a man whom I will call George. He shared with me that he was abandoned by his father while in the womb, and his grand-parents shamed him all his life. He wanted freedom because he was not able to bond with his son, whom he really loved and with whom he wanted to connect. Everyone deserves more than ten minutes to be listened to but that is what I had.

Based on what he shared with me I led him though the five Keys of Unbound.

The Five Keys of Unbound Ministry are: Repentance and Faith Repentance is a change of mind that leads to a changed life. I

Repentance is a change of mind that leads to a changed life. I learned about this a long time ago during a Life in the Spirit seminar. It involves turning from sin and surrendering to God. Faith is receiving God's revelation in Jesus and trusting in him.

Forgiveness

When we walk by the Spirit, he shows us how important it is to let go of resentments. Forgiveness means giving up the right to hold on to our offenses. When we forgive in Jesus' name, we allow God's mercy to heal us by letting go of bitterness and resentment.

Renunciation

Renunciation means we make no place for sin and darkness in our lives. We take our stand against the kingdom of darkness by specifically renouncing sin, deception, idols, and evil spirits in the name of Jesus. Renunciation breaks the power of darkness in our lives.

Authority

Speaking out loud, we command every evil spirit that was renounced to go in the name of Jesus. We dispel the darkness by exercising our authority as sons and daughters of God, and we claim the victory of Jesus over our enemies.

The Father's Blessing

The Father's Blessing is an invitation to experience God's heart toward us as he imparts to us our identity, purpose, and destiny. We speak words of blessing that come from the Father's heart for the person and fill them with God's love. When these Five Keys are applied to a person's story in an Unbound ministry session, addressing their wounds and areas of bondage, the power of Jesus is released to heal and set them free. When I ministered to George, I first led him in a prayer of surrender to the Lord. Then, I led him to pronounce forgiveness towards his father and grandparents. Then, he renounced some things like abandonment, rejection, an orphan spirit, homelessness, and the lie that he does not belong. He also renounced loneliness and isolation. When I gave the command the first time, he was not experiencing freedom. After waiting on the Lord and


reflecting on his story, I asked him to repeat this renunciation: "In the name of Jesus, I break the power of any negative word spoken over me when I was conceived, in the womb and at birth." I affirmed him by speaking the command again. This time, freedom came over him like a flood. I prayed and spoke to George words of the Father's affirmation. The Father who loved him from the moment of his conception, breathing life into him. I spoke to him of the Father, who celebrated his birth and wept with him in his pain and so much more. When I hugged him at the end of our ministry time, I noticed that his wife who was present began to cry. In that moment, George received a father's embrace. As they walked away, she kept repeating, "It was the hug!" I do not know what she saw or felt at that moment, but I know that George receiving a human touch, especially from a father, is what she had been praying for. At Heart of the Father Ministries, we train people to use these Five Keys during Unbound ministry sessions, which are much longer and in depth than the example I have shared. However, the Five Keys can be used in a variety of contexts, and many people are experiencing the power of the gospel as they take hold of the freedom Jesus won for them.

St. Francis Xavier equips the children

St. Francis Xavier was one of the founders of the Jesuits and the great apostle to the far east where he brought the Gospel to India, the Philippines and Japan. In India he ministered to the point of exhaustion, baptizing countless people. In his great need he equipped others, even children, to help him:

"As I could not go myself, I sent round children whom I could trust in my place. They went to the sick persons, assembled their families and neighbours, recited the Creed with them, and encouraged the sufferers to conceive a certain and well-founded confidence of their restoration. Then after all this, they recited the prayers of the Church. To make my tale short, God was moved by the faith and piety of these children and of the others, and restored to a great number of sick persons health both of body and soul. How good He was to them! He made the very disease of their bodies the occasion of calling them to salvation, and drew them to the Christian faith almost by force!"

This saint provides a great lesson for us, calling on the lay faithful, even children, to support his apostolic work of deliverance and healing. These faithful children healed both soul and body by calling on the power of God, and their trusting hearts made them instruments of evangelization and salvation for the Indian people.

St. Catherine of Siena: A Saint for Healing and Deliverance

St. Catherine of Siena was one of the saints that God used powerfully in the ministry of deliverance. Kansas City Conference, 1977

JESUS IS LORD!

Jesus Christ is Lord! In 1977, a gathering of about 52,000 people came together for a conference in Kansas City (more than a dozen denominations), of which 50% were Catholic.

Preacher to the Papal Household since 1980, Cardinal Raniero Cantalamessa, O.F.M. Cap., writes in his book *Sober Intoxication of the Spirit: Filled with the Fullness of God* (p 131):

The most vivid memory I have of that famous ecumenical charismatic conference in Kansas City in 1977 was the banner that filled the sky from one end of the stadium to the other: "Jesus is Lord." I knew this title belonged to Jesus, but to see His lordship lived and celebrated by all those people was a revelation for me. The Holy Spirit has raised up the charismatic renewal chiefly for this: to rediscover and proclaim that Jesus is Lord. That is truly the defining act of our Pentecost.

The Conference: In the October 1977 issue of New Covenant (NC) magazine there are 11 pages devoted to the conference, Conference Chairman, and NSC/Pentecost Today USA Executive Director at the time, Kevin Ranaghan gave the main address on Wednesday night and "discussed the unusual spectacle of Christians from widely divergent - and sometimes antagonistic - backgrounds coming together to proclaim their oneness: 'We don't exactly have a reputation for mutual love, unity and brotherhood. We're known to think differently, to act differently, to pray differently, to sing differently, to dress differently....Yet on all of us, in spite of

our divisions and separation, God has poured out his Holy Spirit" (NC, pp 4-5).

Morning sessions were held in downtown Kansas City, by the individual denominations, during which each could express its unique identity. Afternoon workshops were offered by various denominations but open to everyone to attend. The evening sessions were held at the Kansas City Arrowhead Stadium for all. In the *New Covenant* articles (p 6) there is a reference to the fact that nearly two-thirds of the 78,000 seats were filled each of the four nights.

Sharon Poppleton, Covenant Community Member, wrote of her experience, "I know for me, the Kansas City Conference gave a vision and a hope. Every year or so, I watch the video of the conference online. I weep remembering the unity experienced. I weep when I think of the Father's desire for his children to love each other. I weep for the pain of the Son's broken body, and the hope that the Holy Spirit has put into all of our hearts is reenkindled....You could say that those who were in Kansas City in 1977 experienced a tangible awareness of unity in the Spirit that left you forever changed....For those five days we were indeed one in the Spirit, one in the Lord!"

Three Rivers of Renewal: By 1970 there were three major groupings of Pentecostals: The Classical Pentecostals who were the direct descendants of the Topeka and Los Angeles outpourings; the Protestant denominational and independent Charismatics; and the Catholic Charismatics. And they were all talking to each other! (*The Charismatic Century*, [TCC] Jack Hayford, p 232).

Vision for a Conference of Conferences: Jack Hayford refers to the 1977 Kansas City Conference, July 20-24, as the "conference of conferences." "Since so many of the various Charismatic groups in the denominations met for annual conferences, why not have them all meet together in one city and hold their own sessions during the day-time with joint sessions in the evening?" (TCC, p 237). A committee composed of the ten different denominational and non-denominational groups who would be part of the conference planned for three years.

Holiness: Friday evening's session was devoted to the theme of holiness. "Cardinal Leo Joseph Suenens, of Malines-Brussels, Belgium, further advanced the theme of holiness as complete surrender to God. 'Christians,' the cardinal said, 'need eyes to see, ears to hear, a face full of love, hands to reach out, a heart to embrace, and feet to go forth and spread the good news."

"Impressing on his hearers the importance of dedicating their lives to God's service, Cardinal Suenens said, "The world is dying because it doesn't know the name of its Savior, Jesus Christ. We have to be Christianized again, in depth, so that the world will see something of the Lord shining through us" (NC p 8).

Holy Ghost breakdown: Christianity

Today captured the proclamation of the name and Lordship of Jesus that took place soon after Cardinal Suenens' exhortation in this way: "Then came Bob Mumford of Cupertino, California, an independent Bible teacher who travels widely in charismatic circles. At one

point he challenged Christians to drop their fearfulness and defensive mentality. He held his Bible aloft and said: 'If you take a sneak look at the back of the book—glory, hallelujah—Jesus wins!' The crowd began cheering. 'Glory to God! Jesus is Lord!' Mumford shouted, setting off the kind of thunderous response the Chiefs get after a touchdown. The lights on the giant scoreboard flashed repeatedly, 'Jesus is Lord' and 'Praise the Lord.' Next the scoreboard displayed pictures of the face of Jesus and of a crowd with uplifted arms worshiping him" (August 12, 1977, p 36). This lasted for close to 15 minutes. Dorothy Ranaghan commented, "I've never heard anything quite like it. It was the high of the conference and such a show of unity. I'll never forget it."

Worship: The *New Covenant* article (p 6) relates that "Music was one of the most notable aspects of the worship at

the conference, as well an expression of the unity among the participants.... Traditional hymns and familiar songs of the Catholic charismatic renewal alternated with favorites from other streams." Dorothy Ranaghan related that, "The worship alone in a gathering that size was extraordinary."

Rita Dockry shared, "It was amazing because it was a huge stadium full of people who love Jesus, all different denominations, worshiping together... people were on their knees, praying. You could feel the power of the Lord!" Norma Cahill recalls that it was "so awesome to see that many people from various backgrounds. It was exciting to see what God was doing!"

Fr. Kilian McDonnell, O.S.B. referred to the experience of Spirit baptism as an "ecumenical grace" that created the active pursuit of visible Christian Unity (TCC, p 233).

Prophetic Word: During the conference, one of the prophetic Words was proclaimed by Ralph Martin: "Come before me with a broken heart and a contrite spirit for the body of my Son is broken. Come before me with tears and mourning for the body of my Son is broken. The light is dim, my people are scattered – the body of my Son is broken. I gave all I had in the Body and Blood of my Son. It spilled on the earth. The body of my Son is broken. Turn from the sins of your fathers and walk in the ways of my Son. Return to the plan of your father. Return to the purpose of your God. The body of my Son is broken." ♦

From the Executive Director

Newness of the Spirit

Each Lent (and Advent!) Cardinal Raniero Cantalamessa, the Preacher of the Papal Household since 1980, delivers homilies to Pope Francis and the Papal Household. In his first sermon of this Lent, Cardinal Raniero Cantalamessa, O.F.M. Cap., focused on "the newness of the Spirit" and the need for **constant renewal and conversion,** both individually and in the Church as a whole.

Today in the midst of darkness and trials, we see the Holy Spirit bringing renewal and conversion in our nation, in the Church, and in the Renewal! *Veni, Creator Spiritus*.

In the Nation...

On February 8, 2023, a 16-day spontaneous spiritual revival at Asbury University's campus in Wilmore, Kentucky. Wilmore is home to 6,000 people, but it was hosting 50,000 to 70,000 during the revival. Revival continues as news of how the students (and eventually many people from different denominations and from across the nation and around the world) remained in the chapel continuously in a posture of praise, thanksgiving, and humility. A number of those who attended the Charismatic Leaders Fellowship meeting in Augusta testified to the centrality of the Holy Spirit rather than any one person leading the revival.

In the Church...

On the Feast of Christ the King on November 20, 2022, following the Synod of the Archdiocese of Saint Paul and Minneapolis, Archbishop Hebda sent a Post-Synodal Pastoral Letter to the Faithful of the Archdiocese. The letter was entitled "You Will Be My Witnesses: Gathered and Sent From the Upper Room." A Section was devoted to the importance of the Holy Spirit: "I encourage our pastors and their lay leaders to ask themselves this question: Is our parish ascending to the Upper Room of the parish each week only for the breaking of the bread and not for the outpouring of the Spirit? At stake is whether or not the fire of Pentecost will empower us to 'go forth' from the Upper Room of our parishes." Archbishop Hebda writes that he has appointed a Vicar of Charisms in order to cultivate the charismatic gifts in the diocese and invites parishes to engage the Catholic Charismatic Renewal Office and many other ministries within the Archdiocese which "carry the fire of the Spirit at the heart of their apostolates".

In the Renewal...

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Three Distinct Calls from the Holy Spirit

ow does one see what the invisible God is doing? How do we see evidence of the Holy Spirit moving in our lives, in our church, in our world? Jesus tells Nicodemus in John chapter three that in being born from above, one can see the Kingdom of God. Many in the church have lost the "fear of the Lord" and replaced it with the "fear of man." Are we more afraid of what others think of us than what God thinks? Are we willing to sacrifice our reputations, livelihood, and our lives? If we truly draw closer to Christ, we will draw closer to sacrifice and suffering. He is calling us into deeper love.

3 Live More In My Spirit

In the Church, have we moved the

Holy Spirit to the periphery of parish life? How often do we hear the Holy Spirit preached about from the pulpit? Are we getting catechesis on the Third Person of the Trinity? The early Church understood real conversion to include the manifestations of the Spirit's presence (Acts 8:16). Are we walking in the power of the Spirit? Jesus is calling us into deeper life in his Spirit! O Lord, give us the courage to respond to your call. ◆
